

BAYVIEW COMMUNITY UPDATE October 13, 2004

Late Night Basketball

Three more games will be played tonight at Joe Lee Rec Center, starting around 7:15 p.m. The games will be preceded by a workshop (facilitated by a Bayview officer) which focuses on how individuals can have their driving privilege reinstated following a license suspension. In addition, Pete McHenry of RMC Pacific Materials (420 Mariposa) will be making a presentation regarding employment with RMC.

Halloween

There are numerous Bayview CBO's (community based organizations) planning Halloween celebrations in the district. The main purpose of these events is to provide a safe venue for the kids, so that they can have fun on Halloween under appropriate adult supervision. We are working with each of these groups to ensure a police presence at every venue, in an effort to reassure children and parents alike that they will be safe on Halloween.

Crime and Enforcement Update

On October 11, at 9:06 a.m., Bayview officers responded to the 700 block of Sweeney Street on a domestic violence call. The officers were met by the female victim and they then located the husband, who was bleeding from a hand wound. As the officers were interviewing the husband, he suddenly punched one of the officers and was arrested. The husband was handcuffed and he then kicked one of the officers. (Note that the husband was fairly liquored up.) The officers interviewed the couple's three children, who had been present throughout the evening, and the children admitted that their father had threatened their mother with a hunting knife, and had then threatened to kill various family members. The husband was booked for a variety of offenses, including domestic violence, making terrorist threats, and battery on a police officer (041 164 550).

On October 12, at 10:07 a.m., Bayview officers responded to the Islais Creek landing after receiving calls from nearby residents that pieces of aluminum railing had been stolen from the dock. After inspecting the remaining railing, the officers responded to Bay Area Metals on 3rd Street, the local business which has been caught buying stolen metal in the past. The officers located the stolen railing and seized it, booking it for evidence. The owners of Bay Area Metals were unable to provide the receipt for the person they had paid for the stolen material. The case is being referred to both the District Attorney and the City Attorney for follow-up (041 662 261).

On October 12, at 12:00 p.m. Bayview officers were at 3rd and Cargo dealing with an illegal encampment when they came across a box containing the cremated remains of a person. The box had a name and address on it, and the officers contacted a Taraval unit to go by the listed address. The man at the listed address was contacted, and told officers that his vehicle, which contained his mother's cremated remains, had been stolen. The man immediately responded to 3rd and Cargo and was very appreciative that the box had been located.

On October 12, at 12:20 p.m., Bayview plainclothes officers arrested a man, living on Garrison Street, at Kirkwood and Mendell for an outstanding arrest warrant charging him with fraud, conspiracy and burglary (041 167 651).

On October 12, at 2:20 p.m., Bayview officers saw a woman at Cesar Chavez and Army whom they knew from prior contacts to be wanted for outstanding arrest warrants (for sales of cocaine). The officers stopped the woman, who provided a fictitious name, and upon verifying her identity placed her under arrest. While being transported to Bayview Station, the woman kicked out the side rear window of the radio car and had to be transferred to a van. The woman was charged with the warrant and also with vandalism (041 167 689).

On October 12, at 2:25 p.m., Bayview plainclothes officers were on patrol at Thornton and Latona and saw a man they knew to have a stay-away order loitering on the corner. The officers approached the man, who began to quickly drink from a water bottle in an apparent attempt to swallow whatever drugs he was carrying in his mouth. The man was placed under arrest for violation of the stay-away order, and an arrest search of his vehicle revealed a quantity of crack cocaine and over \$17,000.00 in small bills in a shoe box. The man, living on San Jose Avenue, was booked for transportation of crack cocaine, possession for sale of crack cocaine, loitering for purposes of selling drugs, and violation of a court order (041 167 673).

On October 12, at 7:30 p.m., Bayview officers responded to 3rd and Newcomb on a call of a man brandishing a gun at another motorist. The caller, who was very scared and wished to remain anonymous, stated that he had been driving down 3rd Street when a second vehicle swerved into his lane and the almost contacted his vehicle. When the victim looked at the driver of the second vehicle, the second driver pointed a black revolver at him and yelled out, "Back the (expletive deleted) up." The suspect then fled the area in his vehicle, which is described as a blue Geo Metro with a number "7" sticker on the rear window. This vehicle has been reportedly used in similar incidents around town in the recent past. The driver is described as a black male, 20-25, dark complected, upper gold teeth (041 168 790).

On October 12, at 8:30 p.m., Bayview officers responded to 3rd and LaSalle on a domestic violence call. The officers found a female victim, who told them that she was driving down 3rd Street with her friend and her infant daughter when she saw her ex-boyfriend "rolling dice" on the street corner and stopped to speak with him. The victim stated that she and her ex-boyfreind then became engaged in a verbal altercation, and the ex-boyfreind threw a single die into the vehicle, striking her daughter on the lip. The ex-boyfreind then fled the area, but was later located by the officers. The boyfriend was charged with violation of his probation (041 168 897).

On October 12, at 10:10 p.m., Bayview officers responded to a home on Nichols Way on a report that a mother had battered her 2 year old daughter with a telephone. The caller, who was the grandmother of the 2 year old daughter, told officers that her daughter had struck her granddaughter

across the face with a telephone. The daughter told officers that her mother (the caller) was a crack addict and had called police because her daughter wouldn't give her any money. The officers checked the baby, who had no injuries, and then interviewed the baby's step-father, who was holding the baby. The step-father verified that the caller was a crack addict who was angry at her daughter and had phoned police in an effort to get even with her. The officers attempted to get further information from the caller, but she became hostile and began to change her story. The officers sent a copy of the report to Child Protective Services, and determined after the caller (grandmother) had left that she had provided an alias, and had an outstanding arrest warrant charging her with burglary under her real name (041 169 077).

On October 12, at 10:45 p.m., responded to 16th and 7th Streets on a robbery call. The victim told officers that three young men, one armed with a gun, had just attempted to rob him and had fled the area on foot. The officers took the victim with them as they began to search the area, and they were quickly hailed by a second (female) victim who stated that she had just been robbed at gunpoint by three young men. The officers again began to search the area and, within minutes, found a young man hiding under a parked car at 215 Texas Street. The officers took the man, who was holding currency in each of his hands, into custody. The young man spontaneously stated to the officers, "The gun wasn't real." The officers then saw a second young man running north on Texas toward 18th Street and requested additional units to the area. A responding unit found the suspect, now running south on Connecticut at 23rd. The officers ordered the individual to stop, but he continued fleeing. The officers pursued the suspect on foot, and he fled through the Potrero Hill Rec Center and was lost in the area of Missouri and Watchman Way. The first victim positively identified the suspect in custody as one of the robbery suspects. The second victim, although unable to make a positive identification, did in fact identify her wallet and other pieces of personal property which had been stolen from her, and were found by officers in the suspect's pant's pocket. The suspect in custody, living on Turner Terrace, was booked for two counts of robbery and one count of possession of stolen property at YGC. The two additional suspects, black males in their teens, are both outstanding (041 169 152).

On October 13, at 12:36 a.m., Bayview officers arrested a man in a stolen truck at Newcomb and Toland. The man appeared to be under the influence of methamphetamine, and a plastic baggie containing what appeared to be crystal meth was found in the vehicle and booked as evidence. The man was booked for stolen auto, possession of methamphetamine, and an outstanding arrest warrant charging him with burglary (041 116 664).

On October 13, at 3:16 a.m., Bayview officers responded to a home on Dakota Street on a domestic violence call. As the officers arrived, they saw a man crawling out of a window and then fleeing on foot. The female caller told officers that her ex-boyfriend had kicked in her front door and then battered her, prior to fleeing as the officers arrived. The officers were unable to locate the suspect, but obtained an Emergency Protective Order for the victim prior to leaving (041 169 588).
