

BAYVIEW COMMUNITY UPDATE May 20, 2005

#### Community Meeting

Last night a meeting was held on Hunter's Point Hill to address the recent increase in shootings on the hill. Several residents were present, as well as representatives from Mayor Newsom's office. One of the residents present stated that the police needed to do something about the numerous trespassers in the area and I told the group that we have been arresting numerous trespassers in public housing for months now and needed the residents to assist us by phoning us (anonymously) when they saw trespassers in their developments. The woman stated that she would not do this, and that it was solely our duty (the police) to address these problems. This sentiment, shared by many people living in the Bayview, is why we have the level of violence that remains in this district. In the past thirty days, Bayview officers taken 21 guns off the streets of this district. I brought photos of these guns to the meeting, and I am going to be bringing these photos to all community meetings in this district in an effort to demonstrate to people what my officers are doing on a daily basis. Bayview officers made another gun arrest yesterday afternoon at Westpoint and Middlepoint following the shooting on Northridge. These officers confront the most violent criminals in San Francisco daily, and place themselves in harms way to protect the law abiding residents of this district. They need your help, and without it, the violence will continue in this district.

From Supervisor Maxwell's Office

Saturday, May 21: Grand Opening of the Bayview Hunters Point Farmers' Market. In partnership with the San Francisco Department of the Environment, the Pacific Coast Farmers' Market Association, Literacy for Environmental Justice (LEJ), and Girls 2000, the Bayview Hunters Point Farmers Market will operate seasonally (May 21 - Dec 10) on a weekly basis, Saturdays from 9:30am - 1:30pm, on Galvez Street at Third Street next to Bayview Plaza. Aside from fresh fruits and vegetables, it will offer the community cooking demonstrations and nutrition education, and healthy take-out food. In an effort to make the produce available to as many people as possible, the farmers' market will accept food assistance such as Food Stamps and WIC coupons.

#### Crime and Enforcement Update

Robbery, 1000 Connecticut, May 19, 11:00 a.m.

Bayview Officers Ferraez, Fowlie and Hoo responded on a robbery call and spoke with the female caller who stated that she had been seated on a Muni bus when two suspects approached her and pulled her purse from her grasp. The suspects then fled from the bus. Suspect one is a black male, 14-15, 5'6", 140, wearing a black jacket. Suspect two is a black male, 5'6", 140, wearing a black jacket (050 557 211).

Threats and Battery, 209 Cameron, May 19, 2:20 p.m.

Bayview Officer Wilhelm took a report from a man who stated that he began a relationship with a fellow student three weeks ago, and when he went to end the relationship, the woman became angry and threatened to throw a

"...cocktail bomb" through his window. The female suspect also confronted the victim in the presence of his live-in girlfriend and forced him to choose which woman he wanted to be with. When the victim chose his live-in girlfriend, this enraged the second woman and she kicked and punched the victim, and then threatened to file a false report of rape against him (050 558 322).

Attempted Murder, Unit block of Northridge, May 19, 3:24 p.m.

Bayview Officer Rockwell responded on the report of a shooting and spoke with the female victim who had been shot in the hip and hand. The victim stated that she had been inside her home when she heard some men hanging out in front of her home say, "There's them (n word)," and then saw several men in a passing car fire several rounds toward the assembled men. Four of the adjacent dwelling units were struck by the bullets, and a small girl in one of the units barely avoided being struck by a round that entered her home. The suspects are described as black males, 20-25, wearing black sweatshirts and driving a tan four door vehicle. Numerous witnesses were present at the scene and refused to cooperate with the investigation, thus ensuring that this violence will continue (050 588 366).

Possession Heroin, 3rd and LaSalle, May 19, 3:55 p.m.

Bayview's plainclothes officers were surveilling the area of 3rd and McKinnon (known locally as "heroin alley") and they saw two individuals engaged in what they believed to be drug transactions. Both suspects, as well as a third associate, were detained. The first man, who refused to provide his address, was booked for sales of heroin, possession of heroin, and conspiracy. The second man, living on the 600 block of LaSalle, was booked for the same charges. The third man, living on Thrift, was booked for possession of heroin (050 558 526).

Possession Firearm, Westpoint and Middlepoint, May 19, 4:54 p.m.

Bayview plainclothes officers were working with Gang Task Force members following up on the shooting incident from Northridge. The officers focused their attention on "Westmob" gang territory at Westpoint and Middlepoint since the Northridge area is considered to be territory controlled by the "Big Block" gang, which is a rival to Westmob. The officers were walking through the development when they saw a young man who seemed alarmed by their presence begin to walk away. The young man put his hand to his waistband area (which is a common practice of persons carrying handguns in their waistbands), and the officers approached him to speak with him. The officers could clearly see the outline of a revolver in the man's waistband, and the gun was removed and the suspect was arrested. The suspect, living on the 100 block of Middlepoint Road, was booked for possession of a loaded and concealed handgun (050 559 007).

Battery, 3rd and Thomas, May 19, 6:15 p.m.

Bayview Officers Hastings and Fowler responded on a battery call and spoke with the victim who is a Muni driver. The driver told officers that a passenger boarded his bus with a bag of McDonald's food and began spilling his soda on the floor of the bus. The driver told the passenger to clean up the soda and the passenger then called the driver "...a bunch of mother.....ers." The driver said that he then retorted, "Your mama," and the passenger took offense at this reference to his mother. The passenger punched the victim and was booked for battery (050 559 198).

Possession Cocaine, Thomas and Lane, May 19, 7:44 p.m.  
Bayview plainclothes officers were on patrol when they saw a man drop several rocks of crack cocaine into a planter box upon seeing the officers. The suspect, living on Byxbee, was booked for possession of crack cocaine (050 559 518).

Battery, 3rd and Hudson, May 19, 9:01 p.m.  
Bayview Officer Singh responded on a battery call and spoke with the female caller who was being treated by medical personnel. The victim stated that she had just driven to the liquor store with a man she does not know, and the man became enraged when she asked for a ride home. The man threw the victim out of the vehicle and drove off. The suspect is a black male, 22-25, 5'8", 190, wearing a blue baseball cap with white lettering on it (050 559 712).

Burglary, 2895 San Bruno, May 20, 12:40 a.m.  
Bayview Officers Chu and Rodriguez responded on an alarm call and found that the business (gas station) had a broken window. A witness approached the officers and told them that two suspects had just fled in a gray station wagon after burglarizing the gas station. Suspect one is a black male, 20-25, wearing a Hawaiian shirt and a gray and black beanie. Suspect two was a passenger in the vehicle and was not described (050 560 286).
